This was an action to recover the sum of Two hundred and six pounds, eleven shillings and five pence for a Protested bill and Charges, and goods sold, and delivered this season, and the balance of an account due last year. It appeared on an investigation of the affairs of the defendant, that he was insolvent - and that a large proportion of his creditors had agreed that John Tho Williams should purchase a certain part of his effects, at specific prices, payable at a future period, and the said John Broom was therefore declared to be Insolvent.

It is considered by the Court that the High Sheriff do take care for the disposal of the rest of the effects of the said John Broom, and that a distribution thereof be made agreeably to law. It is considered that no part of the present property in this Island belonging to the said John Broom shall be subject to the payment of any debts he may in future contract until the present Creditors are paid.

afterwards at a meeting of the Creditors. Henry Phillips Esq^r and Thomas Williams and George Garden were nominated as Trustees, and approved by the Court,

Thomas Williams and George Garden were informed of the standing rules and orders of Court respecting insolvents Estates, that Mr Broom must give a Schedule of the whole of his property, on oath, and convey the same to the Trustees, in trust, for themselves and the rest of the Creditors,

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
